The day that Sergiu was installed as the vicar at St. Paul Lutheran in Bucharest, I had to park in front of the neighbors house. I greeted them and asked them about what they were doing. They were sorting what looked like a small pick-up load of garlic.

Romanians often have large gardens, so I asked them where it all came from. They told me it was from some land outside the village. I made a little joke about how I just thought they had a "huge" garden.

After the service in our members' home we loaded the vehicle to head home. They were still working. But they had put a bag of garlic cloves (three bunches like pictured), in next to the car. They gladly said it was for me. I offered to pay, but they refused so I thanked them greatly and wished them God's blessings.

This was a simple interaction. But this is the sort of moment that I continue to pray the Lord will provide. These are how we can share the love of Christ simply and also nurture a relationship with people to share Him more clearly in time.

At the beginning of June we installed Sergiu Trifa as vicar at St. Paul's in Bucharest. I had the privilege of preaching and carrying out the rite of installation on this occasion. Sergiu is the son of Rev. Sorin and Flori Trifa. He is a student at Concordia Theological Seminary in Forth Wayne. He will spend the coming year serving in Bucharest.

This could not be a better assignment. If you think it was planned, then you would be right! Sergiu grew up in Bucharest and

has many friends and connections in the city. Sergiu will live in Bucharest and, by God's grace, help this congregation to be more firmly re-established. This will be an incredible blessing for our mission and the future of the church in Romania. Please pray for him and St. Paul Lutheran Church.

But his assignment will help even further. I will serve as his "supervising pastor" during this year, but he must speak to me in Romanian! Of course if we get "stuck" he will help in English, but this will go a long way to improving my Romanian to be more conversational and natural. We have arranged for weekly meetings and get along very well.

Sergiu also comes as a Romanian with the blessing of the training from our seminaries. The theological and practical preparation from our seminaries is an incredible blessing for pastors in Europe. I pray that this will not be his only year, but that he may return and serve here for the good of the Gospel.
